Over the past three years, the School District of Manawa has embarked on a deliberate improvement effort that involves every staff member in the district, all students, and you. District staff are continuing training in the seven principles of the Rapid Improvement (RI) Process. The seven RI principles include:


- Make the problem-specific & user-centered.
- Variation in performance is the key problem to address.
- See the system that produces the current outcomes.
- We cannot improve at scale what we cannot measure.
- Anchor improvement in disciplined inquiry.
- Accelerate improvement through discipline and collaboration.
- Fix what is bothering you.

Staff use strategies that help us apply the seven RI principles in our daily work.

The SDM has four categories on which improvements are focused to include: learning, safe and orderly environment, engagement and satisfaction, and operation efficiencies. In each category, there are several ways the District is measuring our progress on the key performance indicators.

Over the course of the school year, staff will be sharing our progress on each of the key performance indicators during the presentation section of the regular Board of Education meetings. New School Walls Have Meaning

As I look out my office window, I can't help but be excited about what students in Manawa will be experiencing when they return to school next year. The rumbling of trucks, the whir of the drills and saws, and the buzz of activity that occurs a few feet from my workspace remind me of bees in a hive. It is easy to get lost in the newness of learning spaces,

but we must constantly remind ourselves why we are moving forward with the renovations and upgrades.

The return to a middle school concept of education will benefit the students in Manawa for decades to come. These students are not simply older elementary students nor younger high school students. There are dramatic changes that occur in the lives of these students that require a different and unique approach to education. The onset of puberty disrupts the relatively smooth elementary school years and has an impact on the cognitive, social, and emotional lives of the children.

The teachers realize this special time of life and look to establish a mentor-type relationship between teacher and student. These small communities of



learners help to promote personalized learning in a way that supports social-emotional growth. Best middle school teaching practices emphasize the power of personal adult relationships, safe school climates, student roles in decision-making, and small learning communities. Adolescence is a tumultuous time with students' preoccupation with creating their own identity. The close-knit structure of the middle school pro-

vides opportunities for students to dress-rehearse these social schemes with the guidance of a caring and knowledgeable staff.

So as the walls begin to rise on the newly constructed learning spaces for the students in Manawa, staff will continue to re-visit the reasons why we are creating these spaces. The new walls represent a safe haven for students to come to school on a daily basis and feel supported and cared for, by professionals that understand the challenges students face. While the traditional definition of the word school is a place where children are educated, the new Manawa Middle School will be a place where social and emotional abilities will also be fostered to provide solid foundations for lifelong success!



Wednesday **Collaboration** Part 2

What do teachers do on early release days? This is a question we have heard off and on since the district implemented Wednesday early release days. The short answer is time for collaboration for student success. The long answer includes a teacher's impact on learning,



school improvement, and building relationships. This is the second in a series of three articles that discuss the need for Wednesday collaboration time and what the teachers are doing during this time.

The School District of Manawa has taken on the commitment of School Improvement Planning for Performance Excellence. Over the past two years, the administrative team has received training through CESA 6 on this systems approach. So far, this training has resulted in the district Plan on a Page and the use of Rapid Improvement tools with staff. Last year, the principals with support from the rest of the administrative team, created building plans on a page. These plans led to the formation of Goal Teams in each building. Goal Teams are made up of teachers who are dedicated to researching and implementing strategies to help the building meet its Key Performance Indicators (KPI) from their building plan. Every other Wednesday, Goal Teams meet to continue their work. Some examples of their work include recommendations for district-wide assessments that are more aligned to state-mandated assessments, organized service-learning projects, and intentional academic and career planning strategies.

Our district is always looking to make improvements and continue its growth. Having this focused time for goal teamwork every other Wednesday provides us this opportunity.

DONNA WHEELER – PREP COOK





Effects of Trauma

STURM MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Sturm Memorial Library, together with the School District of Manawa, will be showing the documentary Not Enough Apologies: trauma stories beginning at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday Nov. 20 at the Sturm Memorial Library.

Not Enough Apologies is a new documentary from Wisconsin Public Television that explores the lasting effects of traumatic experiences on children and adults and suggests new ways of serving and assisting those who struggle because of trauma.

Viewers learn how adverse childhood experiences can result in changes to the brain leading to behavioral and mental health problems.

As more and more educators, doctors, psychologists, librarians and parents are learning about the lasting effects of trauma, a new way of providing services called Trauma Informed Care is emerging.


This documentary is relevant to anyone who has children, or works with children in any capacity.
