Hoffman Planning, Design, and Construction Inc. personnel have been very busy mobilizing contractors who can accomplish projects at both schools during the closure. Manawa Elementary School has new flooring in the classrooms and common shared

space, the library, staff workroom, multipurpose (band) room, and music room. The fitness center addition on Little Wolf Jr./Sr. High School is progressing quickly. The concrete foundation was poured now that the frost has gone out of the ground. Electrical and plumbing utilities are expanding into that area. The large windows that are a showcase feature of the fitness center are being installed.

The foundation preparations are being made for the new secure entry to Little Wolf High School/Manawa Middle School. Old lockers that were unusable have been removed from the corridors. The elevator from the ground-level fitness entrance up to the main floor gymnasium and classrooms is being installed. The band and choir room soffits are being removed. If time permits, the band room pit will be filled. There is a flurry of activity wherever you turn.

Some of you have asked if all this construction/remodeling work going on now means that the referendum projects at both schools will be completed earlier



next summer. Unfortunately, the answer is no. The greatest challenge in moving forward is not mobilizing contractors or their work crews. The greatest challenge will be getting the supplies. For example, one of the contractors' shipments coming from overseas is on a ship that the U.S. will not presently allow into port. It is not known how long it will take for the supplies to be



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trucked to Manawa once the ship has permission to dock. Given the uncertainty of access to critical supplies, the timeline for completing the referendum work may need to be adjusted. Rest assured, everyone at Hoffman is working hard to prepare both schools to welcome students next fall.

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NOTES FOR NOW... BREAKFAST/LUNCH PROGRAM

The School District of Manawa is partnering with Kobussen, LTD to run bus routes with the addition of a city route to do once-daily home delivery of breakfasts and lunches. All children aged 18 years or younger are eligible for a free breakfast and lunch. Any families living within the district boundaries to include public and private school students, homeschooled students, open enrolled students, and parents with children not yet in school (birth to three years of age) may request the free meal service by contacting either the Manawa Elementary School or Little Wolf Jr./Sr. High School office.

Thank you to Business Manager, Carmen O'Brien and Kobussen Buses LTD terminal manager, Jacob Elsner, for coordinating this effort. On a typical day, the district prepares and delivers at least 341 breakfasts and 341 lunches for about 150 families across the district. In addition to the meals, deliveries include MES and LWJSHS educational materials.

The district has strict guidelines to protect staff doing deliveries. They each carry a backpack with gloves, masks, disinfectant wipes, and hand sanitizer. There is no person to person contact. Deliveries are left on the front doorstep or hung from a doorknob. Some families have placed a cooler or another container outside their door. Families are also reminded to keep pets on a leash or in their kennels during the delivery time.

The daily delivery system has provided many members of our support staff along with our partners at Kobussen with meaningful and purposeful work as well as a steady source of income. More importantly, the daily reward is knowing that our students are receiving nutritious food and the learning materials they need to continue to thrive.

Be reminded that every Wednesday is the SDM public school materials pick-up day using the bus delivery system. Please be sure to:

- Put completed assignments/projects, work packets, used USB drives, library books to return, and so on into a plastic bag.
- Use a permanent marker to label the outside of the bag with your child's first and last name and the name of your child's teacher (elementary) or grade-level (secondary).
- Place the bag outside your door or hang it from the doorknob by 9:00 a.m.

Learning Continues Even During Closure

Even though the school doors are forced to close, learning does not need to stop. Doing everyday chores around the house can turn into fun learning experiences for any age child. What a great way to apply academic skills to everyday life! The following list offers some simple ways to keep educating children while they are at home:

While reading a story with children, have them tell you what is happening in the story, who the characters are, predict what will happen next, or add sounds to the story.

Also try:

- Singing songs together
- Reciting nursery rhymes
- Matching socks when doing laundry
- Going on a scavenger hunt around the house looking for different shapes, colors, or letters
- Drawing and coloring pictures
- Counting how many steps it takes to walk from one room to the next
- Playing board or card games
- Helping cook or bake; this can be a science lesson (how does yeast work), a math lesson (what is one half cup plus one third cup?), or a reading lesson (does this label say "baking soda" or "baking powder" and what is the difference between the two items?)
- Planting seeds in a cup with soil, watering the seeds to help them grow, measuring weekly how tall the flower is growing

- Using recyclable items such as egg cartons, paper bags, water bottles, toilet paper rolls to make art projects
- Taking photos together, making funny faces, and funny poses; making them into a collage
- Finding rocks around your yard and painting them
- Creating play forts
- Writing a letter to a pen pal or family member

The possibilities are endless! We hope that even during this time when students are away from school, they find plenty of ways to keep learning. Be creative and work together to make the best of this situation.

Low Interest Rates Benefit Taxpayers

The School District of Manawa entered the market for the second borrowing for the \$12 million referendum project in February 2020. An interest rate was secured at 1.84% for \$4.5 million. In 2019, \$7.5 million was borrowed at a rate of 3.24%.

Throughout the refer-

endum process, district

financial consultants at R.W. Baird estimated 4% in interest. Due to these secured lower rates, the referendum payments will be smaller each year for the next 20 years than what was projected. This totals \$1.5 million less in interest payments than what was previously communicated to taxpayers.

Referendum payments are outside the revenue limit and have no bearing on how much the district can tax to cover expenses. Lower payments, though, do reduce the mill rate.

Thank you to Premier Community Bank for purchasing some of our bonds.

Helping Your Child with Digital Learning Now that the digital learning are is well upon us and due

Now that the digital learning age is well upon us, and due to unforeseen school closures from Covid 19, it seems timely that we have conversations with our children about how to support their technology and how they best learn with this medium. Learning the ins and outs of technology as parents seems a daunting task. The ease that students take to it is

like many things in life, that it comes easier or more naturally the younger you are. Parents have enough challenges keeping up with the traditional delivery of instruction. As schools shift toward online platforms and E-learning devices, tech-challenged parents may feel intimidated.

After reading many articles about digital learning several tips are universal to assist parents in being involved in their child's education. One of the first things recommended is to ask your child to show you how they are proficient in their technology. Many children embrace the opportunity to be "the teacher" to their parents about technology. This strategy is used by educators at both the secondary and post-secondary levels. You are demonstrating that you are a life-long learner!

The second recommendation is to simply Google what it is you are looking to learn. The world of YouTube virtually covers a myriad of tutorial videos. Surprise your child by contacting them via a new medium like Google Hangouts or Facebook Messenger. The connections that you will make will demonstrate your willingness to be engaged in their world.

Often overlooked by parents is the importance to keep technology public in the home. Keeping the computer in common living spaces as opposed to the bedroom allows parents to monitor digital interaction and communication. What your child is doing on the computer should not be a secret. Parents should "friend" their students on Facebook, follow them on Twitter, and know their online friends. Checking browser histories are also important to know where your child is going online.

Lastly, get excited with your child about digital learning. Education has changed dramatically since the time most parents were in school. Information about everything is at a child's fingertips. With proper supervision, children get to gain insight on career paths, culminate and foster new interests, and demonstrate proficiencies that will lead to promising lives and cutting edge careers. While the face of education is changing, and the challenges are daunting for parents, taking the first step in engaging with your child is just a few clicks away!





SDM Teachers Hard at Work - From Home

SDM teachers are all working hard to ensure that each of their students is receiving a quality educational experience during the school closure. With just a few days' notice, teachers created learning packets or trained themselves in how to do distance learning lessons using Google Classroom. A number of students do not have internet access due to poor cellular connectivity in their area so paraprofessionals download the course content onto USB drives and those USB drives are delivered to student's homes as part of the daily delivery program.

This type of preparation and launching of online learning often takes one to two years. Our teachers poured their hearts into this process and made this new way of teaching/learning a reality because that is how deeply they care



for your child. The district could not be more proud of our amazing staff and what they have accomplished in such a short amount of time.

Watch for family updates on school news and information via the Skylert system through Skyward, the district's student information system.

The SDM staff and administration also wants to thank you and the many caregivers across the community for guiding the children in your care as they "do school" at home. We appreciate your feedback, patience, and gratitude as all of us continue to refine our skills in this new way of doing things.

Virtual Teaching

All teachers are providing office hours Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. except on official school recess days as announced by the district. Teacher email will be available and teachers will respond within 24 hours in most

instances. Students and families can communicate through Google Classroom for students in grades 6-12. Families are also welcome to telephone the school office during normal business hours and you will be put through to the teacher's voicemail so you can leave a message. The teacher will return your call no later than the following weekday.

Second-graders are working on their unit of Earth Science.




