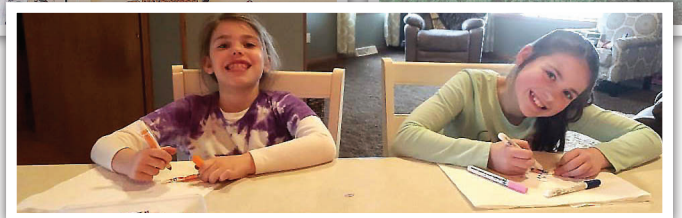

The SDM is actively preparing for the reopening of our schools and sites. As early as July 1, summer school skill/drill athletic programs and weight lifting will begin.

Summer School 2020 will be held from Aug.

To ensure the reopening goes as smoothly as possible, a Districtwide School Reopening Committee is being formed and will meet this summer. The purpose of the committee is to:

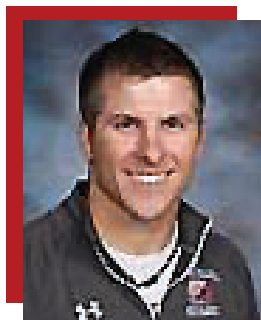
If I have heard it once, then I have heard it a thousand times since March 16: “Everyone is in the same boat.”

Following are some tips for you to make this “quarantine” pandemic a time of inspirational growth for you and your teammates.

Here are some ways to make sure you are prepared for the day you can compete again, considering your basic needs are met:

- Create and maintain a daily schedule. By doing this, you keep yourself from getting into “slumps” that inhibit negative thinking and procrastination. Creating a

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School District Census

Each year, local school districts are required to conduct a school census. This district census is separate and differs from the national census going on presently.

The census is used to gather valuable information on the exact number of children living in the area from birth to age 21.

Results of the census are very important in helping school districts plan to meet their needs, including special program planning, transportation requirements, numbers of teachers needed, budget preparation, etc.

Allocation of state aids is also based on the census.

School districts also want to be made aware of children with potential “needs in the areas of learning, behavior, physical and development disabilities and speech/language. This is a requirement of federal law.

Your time and cooperation in helping census takers conduct a thorough count is most sincerely appreciated. It is helpful to have all households complete the form to indicate whether there are children in the household.

Only one form is needed per family.

Friday Night Lights Shine on Athletes

State championships and all-conference recognition were not in the cards this spring for thousands of high school athletes across Wisconsin.

The state's Safer at Home order essentially shut down all baseball, softball, track, boys' golf and girls' soccer seasons before they even had a chance to get off the ground.

That's why Dawn Millard, Athletic/Activities Director for the Manawa School District, showed up May 15 at the Manawa Athletic Complex at Little Wolf Junior/Senior High School.

"We decided we needed a special way to honor our spring athletes – our seniors – because they missed out on their last season," she said. "We decided to light up the night and get the community involved, so we're having everybody turn on their porch lights, their yard lights. We want them to go out feeling good about their accomplishments even though they didn't get to compete this year."

Eighteen seniors at the school had planned to participate in their respective sports this spring, including Jackson Jaeger, Brett Zielke, Jacob Scheller, Khirsanth Thuecks, Tyler Thontlin, Lexie Fenske and James Scott (track); Alyssa Hedtke, Makenna Jaeger, Sydney Lee, Grace O'Brien, Kirstin Scherneck and Mikayla Wegener (softball); Alex Wepner, Ben Niemuth, Kenny Reynolds and Lane Kreklow (baseball); and Logan Schuelke (boys' golf).

Mike Miller, an announcer at Manawa sporting events for nearly 20 years, read the name of each senior. The athletic complex's lights and scoreboard were lit, as were the softball and baseball fields at Lindsay Park.

"We had a lot of excitement," track coach Patrick Collins said before Miller announced the team's seven seniors. "We had our biggest numbers that we've had in awhile. We had a breakout season last year. We won our first conference championship for our boys since 1970."

Jaeger and Zielke were members of the Wolves' boys' 1,600-meter relay team that placed third in Division 3 at last year's WIAA State Track & Field Championships in La Crosse. Aspen Linjer, a junior this year, placed second in sixth in the girls' 100- and 200-meter dash, respectively.

Meanwhile, Manawa's baseball and softball teams were looking to repeat at Central Wisconsin Conference North Division champions.

"Obviously, they're disappointed, but you can only control certain things in life," Millard said. "They realize it is not something they can control. It makes them stronger in the end."
