


The School District of Manawa taxpayers approved two referenda in November 2018. Since then, the Board of Education, school personnel, and a wide array of focus groups have met to plan for and begin implementation of the maintenance and capital improvements.

The first project undertaken was the demolition of the former elementary building. As citizens drive past the vacant property, the unusable materials have been removed from the site for the most part. Soil being excavated from the middle/high school additions are being deposited on the vacant lot and will be leveled out to provide a green space for student activities. A twenty-six car parking lot will be located on the southwestern section of the lot to provide daily staff parking and overflow event parking.

Over the summer, roof replacement was completed for all of the flat roofs at both schools. Additionally, the library roof at LWJSHS was replaced with a metal standing seam roof. Tuckpointing of masonry was done at the high school. The MES parking lot and bus turnaround was also completed.

This fall, excavation is ongoing for the new middle/high school secure entrance/school office and the fitness center addition. The intent is to have the basic structures framed in before the snow flies so that interior work can continue throughout winter. Some interior projects will also be occurring in the evening after students have gone home and during the winter and spring breaks.

LWJSHS is considered an active construction area in certain zones that are clearly marked. Safety precautions are a priority in containing the work zones. Additionally, all contractors on district property are required to check in daily with the Hoffman onsite supervisor and wear specially designed safety identification. # Social-Emotional Learning

In the last few years, terms like "whole child" and "social-emotional learning" have become buzzwords. These terms are not only popular in the news, but they have prominence in educational conference agendas. But behind the buzzwords are programs, often led and managed by schools, that take into account all the different

things a child needs to be able to learn and grow, even if those things reach outside the traditional roles of a school.

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction defines Social Emotional Learning as, "The process through which children and adults acquire and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions."



The challenges students face today is much different than in the past. Students are challenged by an oversaturation of technology, and they are trying to make friends while all their friends are buried in their phones. As young people's bodies and brains are changing rapidly, they are also grappling with new ideas and influences that will shape who they become. Research also supports anxiety and depression, combined with

the pressure to get good grades and fit in socially, undermines students' ability to learn.

Staff at Little Wolf Jr./Sr. High School are keenly aware of the need to address the challenges of today's students. Professional development in 2018-2019, as well as 2019-2020, has been addressing the issues of training staff to respond to these challenges. Staff talks about these things in the context of "caring for the whole child" or "teaching to the whole learner." The idea is that, for kids to be successful academically, their other needs must be met, too. That includes their social and emotional needs.







## **Wednesday Collaboration Part 1**

What do teachers do on Wednesday afternoons when the students leave early? This is a question we have heard off and on since the district implemented Wednesday early release days. The

short answer is collaboration for student success. The long answer is that teachers are working on impacting student learning, implementing school improvement efforts and building relationships. This is the first of a series of three articles that discuss the need for Wednesday collaboration time and what the teachers are doing during this time.

Research shows that the one person who has the most impact on student learning is the classroom teacher. In order for teachers to improve their practice, and in turn, improve

student learning, they must have time to collaborate with each other around data and content standards. Every other Wednesday, teachers work in Professional Learning Communities (PLC). In a PLC, educators work
