Each Jan. 1, many people consider New Year's resolutions. What new opportunities might 2022 bring for you?

Did you know that the School District of Manawa offers a Senior Tax Exchange Program (STEP) volunteer program? Little Wolf High School, Manawa Middle

School, Manawa Elementary School, and St. Paul Lutheran School all have opportunities for volunteers. Just a few of the many possible volunteer tasks include: lending a hand in the Food Service Department, reading with young children, tutoring students, shelving library books, or taking tickets at an athletic event.

Eligibility:

- 1. Age 62 or older.
- 2. Eligible to receive Social Security.
- 3. Live in the home for which the person pays property taxes in the School District of Manawa.
- Confirm annually or enroll in the STEP program with the school district through Mrs. Ruth Lord, STEP Coordinator. The program provides screening, orientation, and background checks.

Property Tax Credit:

- 1. Credit of \$6.50 per hour.
- 2. Volunteers may be credited up to a maximum of 66 hours in a calendar year (December 1 November 30) for a total of \$429.00

3. Credit will be a check, payable to the municipality and is to be applied to property tax payments.

Hours of operation, rules, and registration forms can be found online. Citizens aged 60 and older may join for free but do need to submit the registration form.

Changes – Preparing for 2022-2023

While 2021 has just closed, the staff at Little Wolf High School (LWHS) and Manawa Middle School (MMS) constantly are looking at structures and procedures to increase opportunities for students. In November, the



Manawa Board of Education entertained and passed a proposal for the school to change from a 7-period day to an 8-period day.

A review of the LWHS and MMS master schedule occurs annually to analyze how continuous improvements can be made. A scheduling committee was formed in mid-September to analyze the possibility of change. Teachers had input and representation throughout the entire process. Past adjustments have been made in 2014, 2015, and 2016 that included a traditional block schedule (4-periods a day), a modified block schedule, and then a 7-period day. The last time the school utilized an 8-period day was in 2016.

As the educational needs of students change, combined with the new opportunities, schools must adapt to what works best for students. A change to an 8-period day for 2022-2023 would address several current issues and provide improvements for staff and students. These benefits include providing for more flexibility in student schedules and course options, providing additional elective offerings for students, including Advanced Placement (AP), and additional middle school offerings.

Additionally, the staff will continue with the focus on numeracy and literacy with the Response to Intervention (RtI) protocol. The process will look different than this school year. Instead of a school-wide RtI period at the end of the day, a more focused approach will be taken. Students who are in need of remediation in numeracy and literacy will have embedded resource periods for credit where math and ELA specialists will dedicate the class period to serving and supporting students' specific learning deficits.

Additional proposals related to opportunities for students will be presented to the Manawa Board of Education for consideration in the coming weeks. Stay tuned to the Wolfpack Express for updates, or feel free to contact Principal Dan Wolfgram with any questions.

Forward Exams

The testing window is from March 21-April 29, 2022. MES staff is working to schedule testing for Last year, our students. the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) made a

few changes to testing by removing some test items which shortened student testing times. Students in grades 3-5 will take the full exam this year. Estimated time for test administration in each grade is 130 minutes for English Language Arts, 90-115 minutes for mathematics, 105 minutes for science (4th grade only), and 70 minutes for social studies (4th grade only). It is important to note that students may take more or less time to complete the test based on effort and ability levels. Below are answers to some frequently asked questions.

What does this mean for my child?

The Forward Exam is a summative assessment that gauges your child's achievement in the content areas tested in relation to grade-level standards. It provides a broad measure of achievement that should be used along with local measures such as report cards, school-wide assessments, and other information about your child's progress in school.

How to help your child prepare? General Preparation

When possible, it is beneficial to establish a daily routine for meals, homework, chores, bedtime, and family time.

Provide your child with a designated study area at home.

Encourage your child to practice good study habits and set aside time every day for homework.



Ensure your child gets a good night's sleep and nutritious breakfast before taking a test.

Offer praise encouragement for achievement and improvement.

Share your enthusiasm and interest in reading,

mathematics, and science with your child.

Remind your child to think positively. Being in the right mindset can make all the difference, Encourage your child to think positively when heading into an exam.

Get into a morning routine that ensures your child arrives at school on time every

English Language Arts Test Preparation

Read to your child and encourage him or her to read to you.

Have your child try crossword puzzles.

Encourage your child to read the newspaper, magazines, and recreational books; and to discuss what they have read.

Play games that involve spelling and vocabulary (scrabble, apples to apples, boggle, balderdash, etc.)

Discuss the events and stories you read

Mathematics Test Preparation

Play games that involve numbers and/or computation.

Encourage your child to make connections between their everyday lives and what they are learning about in math class.

Encourage the use of math every day through measuring recipes, adding prices at the store, creating a budget, explaining graphs and charts in the newspaper or magazine articles, and taking measurements while doing home projects or sewing.



Engaging Learning Activities in MS/HS English Classes

Acquiring new vocabulary words is something that is important at every age.

Having a larger vocabulary base improves reading comprehension, helps students become better thinkers, and can help them to express themselves more effectively. Students can use their new vocabulary words to become better at expressing themselves through writing as well. It can sometimes be a challenge to find new or unique ways for students to learn unfamiliar words.

In Mrs. Millard's 8th grade ELA classes, students have been focusing on using their creative and artistic ability to help them learn definitions to new vocabulary terms. Students are thinking outside of the box to creatively make "Vocabulary Sketches." Simply put, this is where students sketch and draw small scenes to help them picture and master new definitions.

From simple stick figures to beautifully drawn artistic masterpieces, students of all artistic abilities are having fun making their sketches and sharing them with their classmates. It's so much fun to see the different ways in which students can visualize the meanings of new words.

Recently, English 9 students read Homer's epic poem "The Odyssey" and discussed themes relating to the hero's journey and the dangers of arrogance and revenge. In addition to a short quiz assessment, students were also asked to create a game that showcased their learning in this unit.

This year, students were extremely creative in their planning and execution of these games. Not only were students challenged to make an appealing and attractive game they were confident in sharing with their peers, they had to utilize their best problem-solving and communication skills to compromise and divide tasks fairly within the group.

In addition, knowledge of "The Odyssey" had to be the main focus and a clear set of directions were required. Many students initially underestimated the amount of detail necessary for writing effective directions, but they made revisions to clearly convey their ideas. In the last two days of the unit, students played their peers' games and had fun while learning valuable lessons, strengthening their comprehension of "The Odyssey", and, in many cases, exceeding expectations.

In English 12 and College Prep English, senior students

have just begun a Mystery/Suspense unit! As part of this unit, students are working on comparing written text to film interpretations of stories presented in class. They are also working on identifying levels of suspense and how it is built in writing.


Students are each reading a mystery/suspense novel from the library and working on suspense journals. Each week, they choose a story starter or a scenario from a provided website and write creatively to finish the story. Currently, the students are reading "The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" by Robert Louis Stevenson in class and will be watching the 1941 film version in order to compare the two texts.

On Friday, December 3, students broke up into groups and played Master Detective Clue, working on their problem solving skills as well as improving their ability to use strategy to figure out the solution.

Coming up, students will be listening to the Serial Podcast and making judgements of their own about a famous murder case in Baltimore, Maryland! Students are engaged and working hard!




