Welcome to the School District of Manawa! The 2018-19 school year is filled with exciting new opportunities for students, parents, and the community. The district serves about 725 students in four-year-old kindergarten through twelfth grade. The district operates two school buildings. Manawa Elementary School at 800 Beech Street houses grades 4K to six. Little Wolf Junior/Senior High School located at 515 Fourth Street serves students in grades seven to twelve. Paving the Way located at 407 S. Bridge St. provides educational transition services for high school students with special needs.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES:

A full complement of programs and services are available to students such as gifted/talented enrichment, Title I Schoolwide programming (MES), English language support, and special educational services to name a few. The district also takes great pride in offering a large variety of districtsponsored clubs, organizations, and extra-curricular sports and activities.

CUTTING EDGE:

The district is committed to staving on the cutting edge in education for our youth. Our goal is to be recognized in the top ten percent of small Wisconsin school districts. To that end, staff are encouraged to pilot innovative practices with the approval and support of the

Board of Education. One example of innovation is the addition of an engineering and robotics program to the secondary technology education department. Students will now be able to participate in futuristic learning opportunities to prepare them for this rapidly growing area of the job market.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROJECTS:

New energy efficient entry doors were installed at Little Wolf Jr./Sr. High School just before winter. Manawa Elementary School (MES) upgraded the heating and cooling system by installing a new dual boiler system and chiller to replace twenty-year old failing systems. Controls and related mechanical work was also completed to ensure better control of temperatures both for comfort and energy conservation. A dual on-demand water system with water softeners was also added and the old hot water "holding tank" was removed.

School Perceptions Survey

The Manawa Board of Education completed a comprehensive Site Analysis and Feasibility Study with Scherrer Construction and Hoffman Planning, Design, and Construction, Inc. Information from the study was compiled into a district-wide survey.

WHAT DID THE RESULTS REVEAL?

The School District of Manawa (SDM) is focused on the long-term sustainability of high quality instruction, safe and efficient buildings, and fiscal responsibility. Now is the time for action based on the results of the year-long Site Analysis & Feasibility Study and corresponding citizen survey.

The School Perceptions Survey completed in late May/early June garnered 329 responses or about a 14% return rate. While the sample size was a little smaller than the norm, it mirrors the profile of the district fairly well when looking at voting members of the district. The city of Manawa, townships, and village were all represented at close to proportional levels. Thirty-six percent of respondents have schoolaged children and sixty-four percent do not currently have children in school.

THE PRIORITY AREAS TO RECEIVE ATTENTION INCLUDE:

- School Safety/Addressing ADA Accessibility
- Aging Building Systems/Technology Infrastructure
- Better Utilizing School Spaces
- Updating Learning Spaces to Prepare Students for the World of Work

Projects that received less taxpayer support were those related to athletic facilities and a maintenance garage.


WHAT ARE THE NEXT STEPS?

SDM taxpayers indicated that they would consider a referendum if it were smaller than the \$15 million base plan described in the survey. During their Special Meeting on July 12, the Board of Education approved a scaled back, \$12 million proposal that was designed based on the community priorities as found in the survey results.

WHAT IS THE TAX IMPACT?

Currently, the mill rate for the School District of Manawa portion of property taxes is at \$9.14. Because the District is debt free and has been utilizing the Energy Efficiency tax levy, this \$12 million project will result in little to no change in the School District of Manawa portion of property taxes. Property tax bills are calculated using property value multiplied by taxing rates set by the state, county, city/township, technical college, and school district. These rates are all calculated independently of each other. At \$12 million, the revised base plan is estimated to have little to no change on the mill rate for School District of Manawa, keeping it at approximately \$9.14 per \$1,000 of property value.

The Board of Education will be developing referenda wording during July and August to meet the deadline for posing questions on the November ballot. Please watch for upcoming details on community listening sessions to ensure your voice is heard.



Office Hours

Meningococcal Disease: Protect Your Child

teenagers and college-bound students be immunized against a potentially fatal bacterial infection called meningococcal disease, a type of meninaitis.

Meningococcal disease is a rare but potentially fatal bacterial infection that can cause severe swelling of the brain and spinal cord (meningitis) or a serious blood infection (meningococcemia). Meningococcal disease strikes up to 3,000 Americans each year; nearly 30 percent of these cases are among teenagers and college students.

Up to 83 percent of all cases among teens and college students may potentially be prevented through immunization, the most effective way to prevent this disease. A meningococcal vaccine is available that protects against four out of five strains of bacterium that cause meningococcal disease in the U.S.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and other leading medical organizations recommends that all 11-12 years olds should be vaccinated with meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV4). A booster shot is recommended for teens at age 16 to continue providing protection when their risk for meningococcal disease is highest. Teens who received MCV4 for the first time at age 13 through 15 years will need a one-time booster dose at 16 through 18 years of age. If a teenager missed getting the vaccine altogether, they should ask the doctor about getting it now, especially if they are about to move into a college dorm or military barracks.

ABOUT MENINGOCOCCAL DISEASE

Meningococcal disease is often misdiagnosed as something less serious because early symptoms are similar to common viral illnesses. Symptoms of meningococcal disease may include high fever, severe headache, stiff neck, nausea, vomiting, sensitivity to light, confusion, exhaustion and/or a rash.

Teenagers and college students are at increased risk for meningococcal disease compared to the general population, accounting for nearly 30 percent of all U.S. cases every year. Meningococcal disease can be misdiagnosed as something less serious, because early symptoms like high fever, severe headache, nausea, vomiting and stiff neck, are similar to those of common viral illnesses. The

Public health authorities recommend that disease can progress rapidly and can cause death or permanent disability within 48 hours of initial symptoms.

> Meningococcal disease is spread through direct contact with respiratory and/or oral secretions from infected persons (for example, kissing or sharing drinking containers). It can develop and spread quickly throughout the body, so early diagnosis and treatment are very important. Even with immediate treatment, the disease can kill an otherwise healthy young person within hours of first symptoms. Of those who survive, up to 20 percent may endure permanent disabilities, including brain damage, deafness and limb amoutations.

> Lifestyle factors common among teenagers, college students and military personnel are believed to put them at increased risk of contracting meningococcal disease. These lifestyle factors include crowded living situations (for example, dormitories, sleep-away camps), active or passive smoking and irregular sleeping habits. Teens should avoid sharing eating utensils and drinking out of the same container, since infections may spread through this type of close contact.

The district is also required to make public the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction's School Performance Report for each school and the district as a whole. HOME-BASED, PRIVATE, OR TRIBAL SCHOOLING

The Board of Education encourages the enrollment of all school-age children residing in this District in public schools or in approved parochial or private schools so that they may enjoy the benefits of a well-planned educational program and the socialization possible in a group environment.

The Board shall allow students who are being educated at a private school or a tribal school to participate, if space is available, in any of the District's courses by enrolling in up to two (2) courses during each semester. The student must meet the criteria for admission to the high school established for private school or tribal school students.

HOME-BASED PRIVATE EDUCATION STUDENTS

The Board shall allow a student receiving Home-Based private education to attend up to two (2) courses per semester in the public-school classroom provided that the student meets the minimum standards for enrollment in each course as established by the District. Such student may attend no more than 2 courses per semester, which shall include any courses being taken by the student in another public-school district such that the aggregate number of courses taken in a public school district in any semester does not exceed two (2).

A student receiving Home-Based private education may participate in interscholastic

athletics in the District including WIAA sanctioned interscholastic athletics, on the same basis and to the same extent that the District permits students enrolled in the District to participate. Upon request, the Home-Based educational program in which the student is enrolled shall provide the District with a written statement that the student meets the Board's requirements for participation in interscholastic athletics based on age and academic and disciplinary records. No person may provide a false statement.

A student receiving Home-Based private education may participate in extracurricular activities in the District on the same basis and to the same extent that it permits students enrolled in the District to participate.

The District may charge a student who participates in interscholastic athletics or extracurricular activities participation fees, including fees for uniforms, equipment, and musical instruments, on the same basis and to the same extent that it charges these fees to a student who is enrolled in the District.
