
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Referendum Work Underway

Asbestos abatement and demolition work at the former elementary school is starting. Beginning Friday, April 12, the driveway behind the vacant school will be blocked off to all traffic. Bikers and walkers are asked to stay on the 4th Street and Beech Street sidewalks. The public is advised to not take shortcuts across the former elementary site.

Additionally, the public is reminded that all vehicular traffic entering Little Wolf Jr./Sr. High School is to use the west entrance. The east driveway nearest the vacant elementary school is a one-way exit only. Signage is posted to remind drivers of this rule. Traffic patterns will change in the coming months and the public will be notified accordingly. Please take note of the site map above.

With referendum work beginning in April, questions of safety often arise. Senior Project Manager for Hoffman Planning, Design & Construction, Inc., Matt McGregor states, "Site safety is a large concern for Hoffman, and we

take it very seriously especially in the K-12 market." Mr. McGregor published an article in School Business Affairs entitled "Keeping Students Safe Amidst Renovation All Around." (June 2015. pp. 23-25) where he showcased the critical factors in ensuring student safety during school renovation. Communication is one of the most important safety factors according to Mr. McGregor. Before construction, demolition, or renovation even begins, a safety management plan is developed. Mr. McGregor has included the following in the SDM plan:

- Construction access zones that are secure and fenced off with access to trained personnel only.
- Emergency exit routes that may vary as various phases of the project start and end.
- Site-specific safety program that defines how tasks will be completed by contractors with a safety focus.
- Safety coordination meetings scheduled on a weekly basis.
- Safety director from Hoffman who oversees dayto-day overall safety on the job site.

Business Manager Carmen O'Brien and District Administrator Melanie Oppor have weekly meetings with Mr. McGregor. Other district or Hoffman personnel are included as needed. In addition, the Board of Education also has a regularly scheduled monthly meeting. Focus groups of school staff and community members meet to discuss specific projects to include everything from how the secondary science classrooms should be outfitted

to the color scheme of the high school façade.

Hoffman has a site-specific safety plan created that is tailored to the needs of each site along with district-specific expectations. This safety plan is reviewed and signed-off by all subcontractors prior to performing work on site.

Going one step farther, during Hoffman's qualification process they request all subcontractors provide their Experience Modification Rating (EMR). This is a rating provided by the subcontractor's insurance company and providing insight to Hoffman as to how safe that subcontractor is based on insurance claims that have been submitted. Hoffman likes to see all subcontractors' EMRs at or below 1.0.

The temporary life safety plan for Little Wolf Jr./ Sr. High School has been discussed with Fire Chief Rob Rosenau. Now that it has been reviewed with the district, Hoffman will be setting up a meeting in the near future with all parties (village, fire department, police, sheriff, transportation company, etc.) to discuss the approach for the 2019-2020 school year.

Skylert, the district's messaging system will be used to communicate construction safety alerts. The first construction safety alert was sent out on April 10 to let people know about the closure of the driveway that runs behind the former elementary building as asbestos abatement and demolition projects begin. Asbestos abatement of the former elementary building is complete and ensures that there are no airborne asbestos particulates. Once all of the asbestos is safely removed, the demolition process will begin. New construction alerts will be sent out as new projects start, or conditions change in a "construction zone." Watch for these alerts via Skylert, on the district website, and through other forms of local media.

The SDM and Hoffman share a common goal – safety first. Regular communication ensures attention to safety details that allow a productive learning environment to co-exist alongside renovation. Please feel free to contact the district office should specific questions arise regarding safety plans or safety alerts.


MES has some exciting news to share! As we move toward our mission of increasing innovative experiences for our students, Bryant Cobarrubias, Technology Director for the School

District of Manawa, and Jennifer Krueger, Media Specialist for the School District of Manawa, received a grant for \$20,000 for the Manawa Elementary School Makerspace. The grant money will be used to purchase materials used for student learning. You might be wondering what a Makerspace is.

According to the following website, https://www.makerspaces.com/what-is-a-makerspace/, "A makerspace is a collaborative workspace inside a school for making, learning, exploring and sharing that uses high tech to no tech tools. If you have cardboard, Legos and art supplies, you're in business. These spaces are helping to prepare students who need critical 21st-century skills in the fields of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). They provide hands-on learning, help with critical thinking skills and even boost self-confidence."



For students to be ready for the ever-changing workforce, students need to think critically and creatively along with revising their work. Students also need to persevere in their problem-solving. The sixth-grade students at MES recently did a makerspace project in science class where they needed to design a roller coaster. The teacher gave the students the parameters of the project. Students needed to problem solve how to make it all work with the materials provided to them.



This is just one of the many exciting projects that students can be part of with the new makerspace.

Receiving the grant money will open many opportunities for students to explore problem-solving and help to prepare them for their future. We are delighted to have received this grant to make these great things happen for our students!

The authors, both located in Wisconsin, spent the morning teaching students about different ways to improve their own writing.

K.W. Penndorf, the author of books such as Freya and the Dragon's Egg, designed a workshop that focused on the importance of "showing" instead of "telling" when writing a story. Students and parents learned techniques to turn average sentences into powerful ones and had some laughs while doing so. K.W. Penndorf brought energy to the room and talked about the patience and persistence that is also needed to be an author. She held her audience captive with her stories and passion for her writing.

Author, Marla McKenna made a visit to the elementary school on both Friday and Saturday. She spoke with all students 4K-6th grade about her books and her journey of becoming an author. She also delivered a very important message about kindness, patience, and having a positive attitude.

Students, as well as parents, had the opportunity to generate a wildly imaginative story that they could keep to remember their experience.

The workshop included a much-enjoyed cookie break and a pizza lunch provided by the Manawa PTO. Students and parents had a chance to visit with the authors, purchase books, and get autographs. 
Little Wolf Seniors Visit the Manawa Community Living Center

Seniors in Mrs. Koshollek's Enalish 12 course are finishing the year with a unit focusing on wisdom, reflecting on the wisdom they have already gained and the wisdom they have yet to understand. During the unit, students are listening to a teacher-led read-aloud of Randy Pausch's award-winning book The Last Lecture. In addition, the students are reading Tuesdays with Morrie, a heartwarming memoir written by Mitch Albom. As students read, they are reflecting through dialectical journals and identifying the wisdom Mitch was able to gain from Morrie through 14 Tuesdays of time together prior to his death from ALS.

On Wednesday, April 10, students in Mrs. Koshollek's 5th hour walked to the Manawa Community Living Center and spent two hours visiting and plaving games with residents. One highlight of the visit was Ryan Pynenberg's impromptu acapella performance of Frank Sinatra's "My Way". His outstanding rendition brought two residents (and maybe one teacher) to tears. It was an excellent opportunity for students to not only enrich their work with the wisdom we can learn from those who have encountered many challenges and triumphs throughout their long lives but to participate in a meaningful service-learning experience as well.





World Literature Students Study the Holocaust

Sophomores in Mrs. Koshollek's World Literature course are studying the Holocaust through the lens of literature. The book of focus is the captivating memoir Night by Elie Wiesel. To frontload the unit, students engaged in large group discussions regarding the history surrounding the events which ultimately resulted in the death of more than six million people, many of them of the Jewish faith. To illustrate the reality of the large numbers of people who died in concentration camps, students were presented with a poem written by Pavel Freidmann entitled "The Butterfly" while he was imprisoned in Terezin, a concentration camp. This poem, along with many others is included in the book ... I Never Saw Another Butterfly, compiled by Hana Volavkava for the United States Holocaust Museum in Washington Students then created

beautiful butterflies from a template created by Mrs. Zabler. Each unique butterfly was hung from the ceiling in the room and represented a single child who lived during this horrific ordeal. Mini-biographies of each child were read and studied by students. They then participated in an activity entitled "Hello, My Name is..." This activity involves students traveling around the room and introducing themselves to their classmates, but they speak from the voice of their assigned child, sharing facts with each other. At the end of the unit, students learn the fate of their "butterfly" and symbolically cut down those butterflies representing children who did not survive "The Final Solution". Very few butterflies will remain, illustrating a visual representation of the sheer number of children who died in concentration camps all over Europe. This powerful lesson is one students will remember for a long time.








STEM in **Second Grade**





Artsonia is the "World's Largest Student Art Museum". Yet it's so much more than that! It's a free, safe, educational program designed to connect parents and families with their child's creative activities at school.

Manawa art teachers Nancy Zabler (grades 7-12), Sarah Bortle (K-6) and Lori Wilson (retired K-6) have all posted student artwork on Artsonia's online gallery. Parents give permission for their student's work to be visible for public view, and the student is protected with a first name identity; the parent is given an access code for their child.

• Students can look back through their own online portfolios and view their artwork from prior school years.

Students practice writing "artistic statements" to explain their artwork and voice pride in their own work.

• Students, friends and family may purchase mugs, t-shirts, etc. with their student's artwork on it. (Profits from these sales go to the Manawa art departments, which allow that teacher to purchase a few more supplies for the students.)

Once in a while we are lucky to have a student chosen as a finalist for "Artist of the Week". The winning student receives a \$50 gift certificate

for art supplies, and the art department wins a \$100 gift certificate. Most recently. sophomore Samantha Scheuermann was nominated as a finalist. Sadly, she did not win. Artsonia is a national website and often we are up against much larger We are a small district, but we are strong.

The dedication of our Manawa community (population 1,295) earned Samantha 419 votes, whereas the winning student from Binghamton, NY (population 45,179) earned 1355 votes. So per capita, Manawa had a stronger turnout of voters - great job Manawa! The art department very much appreciates the support of our students, and hopefully next time we'll win.




