OFFICE OF THE WAUPACA COUNTY CLERK TO THE VOTERS OF WAUPACA COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a general election to be held in Waupaca County on November 6, 2018, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence if the voter provides proof of residence. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall make a cross (X) in the square next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall make a cross (X) in the square next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall **Note:** A voter must vote for Governor and Lieutenant Governor jointly on one ticket. A vote for Governor is also a vote for Lieutenant Governor. To vote for persons whose names do not appear on the ballot, write the names of individuals for both offices on the lines provided.

If a voter spoils a **paper or optical scan** ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a **touch screen** ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **paper** ballot is marked, it shall be folded so that the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall then deposit the voted ballot in the proper ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit and leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **touch screen** ballot is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question or the voter shall touch the screen next to "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked. 





NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the County of Outagamie, during the General Election on November 6, 2018, the following proposed Resolution of the Outagamie County Board, will be submitted to a vote of the people:

Resolution No. 164-2017-18

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Board of Supervisors does resolve to conduct a county-wide advisory referendum, to be held with the November 2018 general election; that a concise statement of the question is given and that the question will state as follows:

Question: Should the state legislature enact proposed legislation that closes the Dark Store loopholes, which currently allow commercial retail properties to significantly reduce the assessed valuation and property tax of such properties, resulting in a substantial shift in taxes levied against other tax paying entities, such as residential home owners, and/ or cuts in essential services provided by an affected municipality?, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Corporation Counsel prepare a Notice of Referendum to be published by the Outagamie County Clerk in accordance with statutory requirements, and

BE IT STILL FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution and the referendum shall be filed with the Outagamie County Clerk no later than 70 days prior to the election at which the question will appear on the ballot, and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Clerk be directed to forward a copy of this resolution to the Outagamie County Corporation Counsel and the Outagamie County Executive in accordance with statutory requirements.

EXPLANATION

The referendum election ballot will ask County electors to vote "yes" or "no" on the referendum election question as set forth above.

A "Yes" vote on the Question means that you are in favor of the Wisconsin State Legislature enacting state-wide legislation to close the "Dark Store" loopholes. The "Dark Store" loopholes currently enable large commercial retail properties to significantly and disproportionately reduce their assessed valuation and property tax by valuing their retail space to that of vacant or abandoned "dark" properties, resulting in a sizable shift of the tax burden from the large commercial ("big box") retail sector to residential properties and small businesses.

A "yes" vote on Question Number I is a vote to approve the borrowing of \$12,000,000 by the School District of Manawa through the issuance of general obligation bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of a school building improvement program consisting of: construction of additions at the Jr./Sr. High School; District-wide renovations, capital maintenance, building infrastructure, safety and site improvements; and acquisition of related furnishings, fixtures and equipment.

A "no" vote on Question Number I is a vote to deny the School District of Manawa the authority to borrow \$12,000,000 through the issuance of general obligation bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of a school building improvement program consisting of: construction of additions at the Jr./Sr. High School; District-wide renovations, capital maintenance, building infrastructure, safety and site improvements; and acquisition of related furnishings, fixtures and equipment.

In the event a majority of the electors voting on Question Number I vote "yes", the District will be authorized to undertake the school building improvement program described in Question Number I and borrow not in excess of \$12,000,000 therefor; if a majority vote "no" on Question Number I set forth above, the District will not be so authorized.
